Central, Leeds

WHEN, after the first twenty minutes, there were fifty people in the Central Leeds, for the first night of the Funky/New York Disco Scene we began to think that maybe it would be a success . . . as the evening wore on and the place became packed out, jocks (Frank) Dewhurst and Dewhurst and Paul Schofield lost a lot of sweat (as we all did) and found it very hard to wipe great big smiles off their faces.

It very much looks like Friday nights at the Central have arrived ... or 'come back' if you remember how they used to be - with the exception that the music has changed slightly. For those of you as confused as I am after that last sentence, read on...

The Central was once upon a time a regular Friday night Northern Soul Scene. It began to die off, Frank went to the States and the Central closed down. Ian came back from America full of the New York Disco music (and dropping the name Frank as well) got a job as Disco Promotions with Decca and settled down to working

Paul Schofield in the meantime. a great friend of lan's, was doing a highly successful couple of nights at Primo's in Leeds, playing Funk and New York Disco until he left (whereupon the club was sold!).

The two of them got together after a while, went to the owner of the Central, Len Cave, and suggested starting up again but playing the new stuff instead. Len, 28 years the owner of the Central. and a qualified dancing instructor and organ player, readily agreed as he told me, "as a musician and dancing instructor I enjoy this new music they're playing very much". He also told me, by the way, that in his books he's found the earliest mention of music as "Funky" as early as 1912!

The thing was planned out properly. Extra special disco equipment was drafted in to do full justice to the music and it was fingers crossed' time. Both Ian and Paul were very nervous early on (I arrived before the club opened intending to go on elsewhere couldn't leave in the end!) but with the following they both have, plus the closure of the Mecca recently, they needn't have bothered.

Success isn't really the right word. Terrific, fantastic and great come close. The local Yorkshire mob were there in force but people from as far away as Preston turned up — and all without advertising! Everyone I spoke to had a great time, the music was just right and there's something about Northern Soul fans turned Funky dancers that really seems to come together on the dance floor.

The club's open from 9pm-2am and from about 10pm onwards the floor was full as can be. At least a dozen people who said that the club could well become the successor to Blackpool Mecca in the New York

Disco scene. This I doubt because it just isn't big enough and the seaside resort "digs" enabled people to travel for the Mecca. However, musically the Central has filled the gap that appeared when the Mecca closed down,

With New Releases, by their very name, having such a quick turnover, the music played that night will probably already be old hat for some of you. Bear with me though as there are lots of people around the country whose only guide to the top disco sounds is this column. Tips are silly in this situation of course so just a few of the records played and enjoyed

While I accept the fact that harping back to long ago means very little to many current Northern Soul fans it is true that only those

people who remember back before the days of the Torch All-Nighters can see the current change in music in its proper perspective. Northern Soul has always gone through a process of change, even before the name was applied and the move to New York Disco and New Releases just carries the "Tradition" on.

I did get a list of some new Searling before I started to enjoy myself too much and they are: 7 Dwarfs, "Stop Girl" (Ideal); sounds being played by Richard Dwarfs, "Stop Girl" (Ideal); Bonnie Miller, "What Are You Trying To Do To Me" (Astro); BenZine, "Village Of Tears" (Parkway); Richard Popcorn Wylie, "Hanky Panky" (Karen); Betty Boo, "Say It Isn't So" (Kind); Ringleaders, "Baby What Has Happened To Our Love" (M-Pac).
